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Introduction

Welcome to the General Surgery Education and Training (GSET) Program in the Queensland (QLD) Region.

There are various requirements to training that Trainees need to be aware of. Please use this regional guide along with the Training Regulations to familiarise yourself with these requirements to ensure a smooth journey during your time on the training program.

This guide is to assist you to understand how the Queensland region works, with important dates and information.

The Royal Australasian College of Surgeons (RACS) is the principal body for the training and education of surgeons in Australia and New Zealand. General Surgeons Australia (GSA) collaborates with the RACS as an agent of the College, to administer the training program in Australia and manage the Australian Board in General Surgery (ABiGS). ABiGS is the overseer of the GSET Program and reports directly to the Board of Surgical Education and Training (BSET) and the RACS Council.

The General Surgery SET/GSET Program is designed to ensure that the graduating General Surgery Trainee has the competencies and skills required to undertake core General Surgery procedures, is able to participate independently in an acute on call general surgical roster and is competent across the RACS Core Competencies.

General Surgery covers many surgical conditions. The curriculum provides an indication of the breadth of knowledge required. The curriculum should only be taken as a guide as to what you will be expected to cover during your training, as you will not necessarily be limited to the areas and conditions listed.

To assist you during your time on the GSET Program, please refer to the relevant Board in General Surgery Training Regulations.

QLD Training Committee

The Australian Board in General Surgery (ABiGS) of RACS oversees the conduct of the RACS Surgical Education and Training GSET program in General Surgery, reporting to the Board of Surgical Education and Training.

The current Chair of the Australian Board in General Surgery is A/Prof Gabby Vasica, FRACS.

Each region has a state-based Training Committee that reports directly to the ABiGS. The Queensland (QLD) Training Committee of the Australian Board in General Surgery is responsible for providing recommendations to the Board on regional issues including trainee requests, selection, hospital inspections, and educational courses. The Committee also discusses and reviews the progress of trainees that have been placed on Probation or Performance Management Plan/Learning & Development Plan.

The QLD Training Committee consists of the Chair, Dr Katherine Wilson, FRACS, the deputy chair Dr Thomas Arthur, FRACS and a nominated Hospital Supervisor from each hospital with a General Surgery accredited post.

All correspondence to the Chair of the Training Committee is to come via the QLD Regional Executive Officer.

The Training Committee meets four (4) times per year and reports to the Australian Board in General Surgery after each meeting. In most instances the Board will provide final approval to Trainee Requests.

The 2026 QLD Training Committee meeting dates are listed below. Trainees wishing to submit a request or agenda item for discussion must submit their request by the due dates also listed below.

Regular reminders will be sent by email, but it is the Trainee's responsibility to be aware of Term dates, ensure assessments are completed thoroughly and submitted on time. Failure to do so is a breach of the Australian Board in General Surgery Training Regulations and may result in dis-accreditation of the term.

All training issues and concerns are raised at the Queensland Training Committee meetings so it is important to keep the communication lines open at all times. Please keep your contact details, email, address and mobile numbers up to date with the Queensland Regional office.

PLEASE NOTE: As per the Australian Board in General Surgery Training Regulations (www.generalsurgeons.com.au), all trainee requests for interruption must be approved prior to 31 July by both the QLD Training Committee and Australian Board in General Surgery so that requests can be reviewed and processed in time for the assignment of allocations and rotations in the following year. Requests submitted after this date will only be considered in exceptional circumstances.

GSET MID TERM AND END OF TERM ASSESSMENTS:

Assessments are conducted at Mid-Term and End-of-Term via the Trainee Information Management System (TIMS). Please refer to the guides available on the GSA website and the GSET Training Program Regulations for further information.

PLEASE NOTE: Regular reminders will be sent prior to the assessment due dates; it is the Trainee's responsibility to be aware of the above dates. Failure to submit an assessment by the due date is a breach of the Australian Board in General Surgery Training Regulations. The period of training may not be accredited resulting in the Trainee automatically commencing Probationary Training in the subsequent term pending a review by the QLD Training Committee.

QHealth RMO Campaign

The Queensland Health (QHealth) RMO Campaign is the biggest central recruitment drive in Queensland, with all QHealth facilities, Mater and Greenslopes Hospitals, as well as medical specialty networks participating in the process. The campaign portal is **open for the month of June once a year** for applicants to submit an application to over 6000 positions, including training positions.

With surgical sub-specialties, such as the GSET Training Program, **all Trainees are still required to submit an application for the following year via the campaign.** It is the Trainee's responsibility to complete an application by the due date of 30 June each year.

QLD Hub Networks

All the accredited training positions will need to be filled during training terms in regional and greater Queensland. At any time during GSET 1 - 5, a trainee may be asked to work in a position outside South-East Queensland. There is an enormous opportunity to increase your caseload in these peripheral centres and to see General Surgery at its very best. The training is excellent and the hospitals are often very helpful.

It is expected that all trainees will complete terms outside of Brisbane for part of their training regardless of family circumstances. This is in the interest of being fair to all trainees.

Please carefully read the information provided on each of the four hubs - Southside, Northside, Gold Coast and Northern Queensland.

Care is taken in crafting each trainee's program to try and match the clinical exposure to the stage of their development, as well as to their special interests where these are made known. Please let your personal objectives and interests be known such that these can be accommodated where possible.

Once you have been allocated to one of the four hubs you will be expected to remain in that hub for the duration of your training. Please also be aware that due to the large number of General Surgery trainees it may not be possible in some cases to accommodate your preference.

Under no circumstances is any trainee to make contact with another trainee to facilitate a direct swap. Trainees are allocated hubs in their region according to regional processes. Trainees will be required to fulfil any hub rotation allocated to them by the Training Committee. Trainees will not be permitted to change hub rotations unless prior approval has been granted by the Training Committee.

TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES:

The Southside Hub provides excellent opportunities to work in diverse locations, in almost any surgical term, from greater Queensland to regional centres, smaller metropolitan hospitals, and two major tertiary referral centres.

In addition, specialty terms offer excellent exposure to Hepatobiliary surgery, Upper GI surgery (oesophagectomy and Nissan's fundoplication), Colorectal surgery (ultra-low anterior resections, significant inflammatory bowel disease exposure), Breast and Endocrine surgery (multidisciplinary approach), and Transplant surgery (liver and renal transplants and dialysis access surgery). Princess Alexandra Hospital runs a vigorous training programme on two evenings per week, with an exam preparation emphasis. All Southside trainees are invited. It combines with the GSA Core Course.

TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES:

The Northside Hub provides excellent opportunities to train in General Surgery. Training posts are in both regional and metropolitan locations, with hospitals varying from smaller base hospitals to larger tertiary referral centres. It is important to have exposure to both, with some of the most important skills being learnt in the smallest centres. As such, all Trainees will head outside of Brisbane for at least a portion of their training. Subspecialty experience is also available in Breast and Endocrine, Hepatobiliary, Upper GI, Colorectal, Burns and Trauma. There are excellent teaching opportunities in all locations.

Over the course of your training, we will aim to provide you with a good balance of regional and metropolitan hospital exposure. Varying skills are learnt in these locations, all of which are necessary to becoming a good general surgeon. Case load and exposure to endoscopy are considered when allocating jobs, with the aim to provide all Trainees with a good balance of exposure and fulfil their training requirements. Preferences, career aims, and personal situations are also considered and accommodated, if and when possible.

TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES:

The Gold Coast Hub provides excellent opportunities to train in a major regional centre with a heavy clinical load covering the breadth of General Surgery.

Specialty terms include Hepatobiliary Surgery, Upper GI surgery, Colorectal Surgery, and Breast & Endocrine Surgery. Trainees will cover Paediatric Surgery during the Breast & Endocrine rotation.

Trainees allocated into the Gold Coast Hub does not mean that you train at the Gold Coast Hospital for your entire training.

During GSET 1 – 3, Trainees will spend 12 months in one of the regional hospitals listed above. Trainees are expected to attend all training sessions during their hospital allocations.

In GSET 4 - 5 Trainees return to the Gold Coast Hospital and Robina Hospital and participate in training focusing on exam preparation.

The Gold Coast Hospital runs regular training sessions including registrar presentations, clinical VIVA exams, and radiology. Trainees can attend the GSA Core Course via GSA Online website. Leave and support will be granted to attend courses and conferences at the discretion of Hospital Administration.

TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES:

The Far North Queensland Hub of the General Surgery training program provides excellent exposure to most facets of General Surgery and some sub-specialities.

The Hub rotations are based mainly in Townsville Hospital and Cairns Base Hospital. It is possible to arrange for 6-12 months to be spent in a subspecialty unit in Brisbane if registrars have a particular field of interest in which they would like to gain more experience.

Trainees spend the final year in Townsville to facilitate preparation for the Fellowship Exam.

We will endeavour to minimise the number of moves trainees need to make over the five years from GSET1 – 5. However, Townsville has a total of 6 accredited 6-month training positions in General Surgery and other hospitals have fewer, so training will be at several different locations.

The regional setting provides exposure to the full range of General Surgery (except transplantation) and includes Outreach experience in rural and some remote centres, such as Thursday Island.

Most consultants are General Surgeons, many with substantial subspecialty interests. As Trainees do not have to compete with senior registrars/Fellows, there is an excellent opportunity to gain operative experience as first assistance or operating surgeon in a wide variety of procedures.

All hospitals have regular educational sessions. Preparation and practice VIVAs for Trainees sitting the Fellowship Exam are conducted. Trainees can attend the GSA Core Course via the GSA Online website.

TIMS Overview

The Trainee Information Management System (TIMS) provides all Trainees with the ability to view accurate and current information relating to their training.

TIMS allows trainees to view their training profile and to action the following activities:

- Submit/complete assessments and logbooks
- Submit trainee requests
- View hospital rotations
- View complete and outstanding requirements
- View training start date, expected end date and maximum training date

TIMS is accessible through the GSA website (www.generalsurgeons.com.au) via the member login option, enter your RACS ID and password.

PLEASE NOTE: Only access TIMS in Mozilla Firefox, Google Chrome or Microsoft Edge for optimal functionality - **DO NOT** access TIMS through Safari.

If your contact details have changed for any reason, please update TIMS immediately or contact the QLD Regional Office to advise.

Trainee Requests

Trainee requests are reviewed by the QLD Training Committee. Requests can be submitted at any time during your time on the General Surgery Training Program to communicate your needs, movements, and completion of specific requirements.

Trainee requests need to be submitted to the QLD Training Committee using the Trainee Information Management System (TIMS) and all interruption requests must be submitted no later than 30 June.

There are several reasons for submitting a Trainee Request:

- Interruption to Training: Parental Leave, Medical Leave or Personal.
- Interruption to Training: Research
- Other: Used for 'other matters' such as a small exemption of a requirement due to valid reasons.
- Overseas Training
- Flexible Training - Part Time or Split Rotation
- RPL (Recognition of Prior Learning): Skills Courses*
- Accelerated Learning
- Additional Clinical Training
- Transfer Region
- Transfer Hub/Network
- Extension to Training
- Withdrawal from General Surgery

**RACS Skills Courses - please provide the completion certificate to the QLD Regional Office.*

Requests must be submitted by the trainee request deadline. Failure to do so may delay the request until the next meeting.

It is important to discuss requests with your supervisor as they need to be aware of the circumstances surrounding your request. Additionally, some requests require you to include a letter of support from your supervisor.

All requests will be reviewed and discussed by the QLD Training Committee, who will then make a recommendation to ABiGS. ABiGS provide final approval/non-approval and will communicate the outcome directly to trainees.

A NOTE ON TAKING LEAVE:

Please consider taking annual leave as it accrues in conjunction with your unit's relieving availability/requirements, as everyone wants the Christmas period off and all hospitals need to continue functioning. Training regulations limit leave in any surgical term to 6 weeks.

GSET Logbooks

GSET Trainees will use the Australian Board in General Surgery Logbook. The General Surgery Logbook is based on a pre-defined list of procedures, each of which is assigned a number of points. Points are then awarded based on the supervision level when procedures are approved.

Colonoscopy and Endoscopy procedures will also be entered into the General Surgery Logbook and will be counted as per the Regulations.

ACCESS TO GENERAL SURGERY LOGBOOK

The General Surgery Logbook can be accessed via TIMS. Your current rotation will automatically be allocated. Once your rotation is rated, your next rotation will also be automatically allocated, however if you have procedures that need to be entered for your previous term, you will still have the ability to enter that information.

WHEN ARE POINTS AND SCOPE NUMBERS UPDATED TO YOUR PROGRESS BAR

Your points and scope number will be shown in the progress bar once your rotation is marked as Meeting Performance Expectation.

Surgical Education & Assessment Modules

Trainees who commence on the General Surgical Education and Training (SET or GSET) Program in General Surgery will be required to complete the Surgical Education and Assessment Modules (SEAM).

SEAM is an online e-learning program comprising eight (8) modules, which have been developed by the Australian Board in General Surgery. Trainees must successfully complete the following modules during the first two (2) clinical years of SET in General Surgery:

1. Acute Abdomen
2. Anatomy
3. Haematology
4. Nutrition
5. The Operating Theatre
6. Peri-operative Care
7. Post-Operative Care (including Rehabilitation and Palliative Care)
8. Trauma & Critical Care

Successful completion of each module is defined as achieving the minimum pass mark in the summative assessment for each module.

TO ACCESS SEAM MODULES

1. Go to www.generalsurgeons.com.au
2. Select the 'Login' button
3. Enter your RACS ID and password
4. Click on the app launcher in the top left corner, select SEAM

It is recommended that you use your personal computer (not a public or hospital computer) and only one browser (preferably Firefox) when completing modules. This will ensure that your answers are saved and only accessible by you over multiple sessions. There have been compatibility issues with Internet Explorer 9, Safari and Moodle. We recommend installing Firefox to avoid progression issues.

Please Note: Trainees who do not satisfactorily complete all eight (8) modules by mid-term in the second term of their second clinical year will be recommended for dismissal from the Training Program.

QLD Educational Sessions & Courses

GSA CORE COURSE

The GSA QLD Core Course is an annual program where trainees present a clinical presentation on a particular given topic. At each session there are typically two junior (didactic) presentations and one senior (case-based) presentation - in attendance at each session are two expert panel members to provide feedback as required. These panels are Fellows of the College and have kindly given up their personal time to attend.

The dates, topics and presenters for the Core Course program are distributed well in advance via email, as well as available on the GSA Events calendar - it is the trainees' responsibility to advise their Hospital Supervisor of these dates in order to attend.

ATTENDANCE Attendance at the Core Course is compulsory. A minimum attendance of 75% per term at the Core Course has been set by the Queensland Training Committee and supported by the Australian Board in General Surgery. If this minimum is not met it may result in your term not being accredited. Also compulsory is any other training session organised by your hospital.

All absences are followed up via email - if you know you will be unable to attend a session (ill, on-call, annual leave etc), please advise Erin Purcell at gsa.online@generalsurgeons.com.au to avoid unnecessary email follow-up.

WEBCASTS The educational webcast program provides recordings of all educational sessions that are undertaken in each of the regions including the WARTS sessions. These are available in the member's area of the GSA website (www.generalsurgeons.com.au under For Trainees> Educational Resources) and are usually uploaded within 5 business days after a session. These webcasts provide a valuable educational and exam preparation resource.

QUEENSLAND FELLOWSHIP EXAM PREPARATION WEEKEND COURSE

The content of the course is largely dictated by the current curriculum for General Surgery; focusing on issues, topics and scenarios most commonly encountered during the examination. This will comprise of didactic teaching, trial examinations and structured clinical scenarios. Participants will also benefit from learning from one another through significant peer-to-peer interaction.

The Fellowship Exam Preparation Weekend Course is usually held in February /March of each year.

The numbers are capped at 20 participants and priority is given to Queensland GSET4/SET5 trainees intending to sit the Fellowship Exam that same year.

National Educational Program

TRAINEES' DAY REQUIREMENT

The GSA Trainees' Day is a National educational activity, held twice each year as follows:

MAY

- Virtual program, delivered via GSA Online
- usually held on the Monday of the RACS Annual Scientific Conference week

OCTOBER

- face-to-face
- held the day before the GSA Annual Scientific Meeting
- location rotates around Australia

The program aims to cover the breadth of the General Surgery Curriculum, over a five-year cycle. GSA Trainees' Day programs are recorded, and where presenter consent is provided, published as part of the GSA Webcast program for access by all Trainees.

Trainees must attend at least four (4) Trainees' Days over the course of their training. GSET Trainees are required to attend a minimum of two (2) face-to-face Trainees' Days, or their equivalent, to meet the Training Requirement.

GSA EQUIVALENT PROGRAMS

The following GSA programs may also count towards one (1) of the four (4) compulsory Trainees' Days:

GSA MANAGEMENT OF SURGICAL EMERGENCIES (MOSES) COURSE

- open to GSET 4 and above
- face-to-face
- held twice a year in April/May and October

GSA (VICTORIAN) TRAINEES' WEEKEND

Minimum of two (2) days attendance at the GSA (Victorian) Trainees' Weekend

- open to all Trainees, regardless of region
- face-to-face
- usually held in June

OTHER EQUIVALENT PROGRAMS

There are other courses that may contribute to the Trainees' Day Requirement. Please refer to the Regulations for further details.
